

**Susan Eisenhower, *President; The Eisenhower Group*
*Chairman Emeritus; The Eisenhower Institute for Leadership and Public Policy***

Susan Eisenhower is President of the Eisenhower Group Inc., which provides strategic counsel on political, business and public affairs projects. She has consulted for Fortune 100 and Fortune 500 companies doing business in the emerging markets of the former Soviet Union and for a number of major institutions and companies engaged in the energy field. Ms. Eisenhower also serves as Chairman of the Eisenhower Institute's Leadership and Public Policy Programs.

Over the years, Ms. Eisenhower has served on many government task forces. In January 2010, Secretary of Energy Steven Chu appointed Eisenhower to serve on the Blue Ribbon Commission on America's Nuclear Future, which has been tasked with developing a long-term solution for safely managing the back end of the nuclear fuel cycle. In 2000, she was appointed to the Baker-Cutler Commission to evaluate U.S. funded nuclear non-proliferation programs in Russia. Since that time, she has served as an advisor on two other DOE studies: one on the threat of nuclear terrorism, and the other a blue ribbon panel on the future of nuclear energy.

She has served as an Academic Fellow of the International Peace and Security program of Carnegie Corporation of New York, as a director of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace and as an Advisor to Johns Hopkins' Nitze School of Advanced International Studies. Ms. Eisenhower has also been a Fellow at Harvard's JFK School of Government's Institute of Politics and a Distinguished Fellow at the Nixon Center. She currently sits on the Nuclear Threat Initiative board, the Energy Future Coalition and as an advisor to the US Chamber of Commerce's Institute for 21st Century Energy, the Air Force Academy's Eisenhower Center for Space and Defense Studies and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology's Energy Initiative.

She is the best-selling author of "Breaking Free" and "Mrs. Ike," and has edited four collected volumes on regional security issues. Ms. Eisenhower also has penned hundreds of op-eds and articles for publications such as The Washington Post, The Los Angeles Times, USA Today and The London Spectator. She regularly provides analysis for news programs such as CNN International, MSNBC, The Situation Room with Wolf Blitzer, Fox News and the Newshour with Jim Lehrer.

In the 1970s she lived overseas for six years, first while a student at the American University in Paris and then as a London resident and stringer for The Saturday Evening Post. Later she wrote a column for Wolfe Newspapers and went on to write for business, later joining Burson-Marsteller.

She has received four honorary doctorates, most recently from the Monterey Institute, where she was cited for her work on nuclear non-proliferation. Eisenhower received the 2008 Dolibois History Prize from Miami University, and in 2009 she received the Middelthon-Candler Peace Prize and the Distinguished Diplomat Award from the Virginia Military Institute.

She and her team's accomplishments have been featured in Chemical Week and Occupational Hazards. Additionally, she has extensive experience in public policy and advocacy and in collaborating with non-governmental organizations and other stakeholders to realize business goals.

Prior to her corporate roles, she worked as a legislative, regulatory and policy analyst and advocacy professional in Washington, D.C., specializing in the environmental and public health legislative and regulatory arenas. Kateri Callahan is President of the Alliance to Save Energy, a non-governmental organization headquartered in Washington, D.C., whose mission is to advance energy efficiency worldwide to achieve a healthier economy, a cleaner environment and greater energy security. Its Board of Directors includes members of Congress, state and local officials, and top corporate and NGO executives.

Since becoming president of the Alliance in 2004, Ms. Callahan leads the organization's 100-person staff, oversees the annual budget of about \$15 million and serves as the principal spokesperson for the Alliance. She regularly appears before the Congress and the media, and addresses conferences and gatherings around the world. She is a trusted source for credible information on energy efficiency and its role in addressing the environmental, economic and national security issues associated with the use of energy.

Ms. Callahan also serves on the Keystone Center Energy Board and the Business Council for Sustainable Energy, an advisory council to the periodical Better Homes and Gardens, and to the U.S. Chamber of Commerce 21st Century Energy Institute. In June 2009, she was among the 23 inaugural inductees to the new Energy Efficiency Hall of Fame established by Johnson Controls Inc. and the United States Energy Association.

Prior to joining the Alliance, Ms. Callahan served for 11 years as the president and executive director of the Electric Drive Transportation Association, a nonprofit organization that promotes battery, hybrid and fuel cell transportation technologies. She also previously served as a director of government relations for a nonprofit organization, as a non-lawyer professional at a Washington, D.C.-based law firm, and as a legislative assistant to a U.S. senator.

A frequent speaker on women and the environment, she serves as the vice-chair of the board of directors for the Alaska Wilderness League. She has been cited for her Distinguished Service as a board member of the Center for Science in the Public Interest.

She recently launched www.biggreenpurse.com, the only company in the U.S. dedicated specifically to transforming women's environmental concerns into measurable improvements in our quality of life.
